COPELAND'S CORNER....

"In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also." (John 14:2-3)

Preparation Is a Big Theme in Scripture? Some who think they already know the answers do not worry about preparation. Others, who see themselves as spiritual but not religious, tend to believe in the moment and not see the importance of preparation. Preparation, however, is a big theme in the scripture. Preparation is different than planning. Planning may be a part of preparation, but preparation is there when plans and circumstances change. Preparation is getting ready for the Lord to show up. How are you preparing for the Lord to show up? The Lord may show up in your locked room that you want to hide in? The Lord may show up in events that rock you to your core. If you are not prepared for the Lord to show up in these times, it is very possible to miss God's presence and guidance in those times. If you want to make God laugh, tell God your plans. If, however, you want to see God, then get ready.

St. Armands Key Is Preparing For God to Show Up: All that we have been doing in this season of Connection and Discovery has been preparation. This community of faith has been preparing for God to show up and point out the next leader. This time of preparation has been of great importance to recognize God's plan. God has already chosen the next leader. The task of the call committee and congregation is to be prepared when God shows up and says this is the one. We have listened to the collective wisdom of this congregation in many ways as part of that preparation and it has produced a focused Ministry Site Profile and clear understanding of what God is speaking through the church. Now we continue in prayer and preparation as we conform our lives to Christ and grow in Holy love, so that we can love one another as Christ has loved us. That's how we prepare for God to show up!

Other Ways of Preparing: In addition to preparing ourselves spiritually to recognize and respond to God's call to the future, there have been many other ways that this congregation is being prepared. When the new pastor arrives, they need a clear path and all the support possible.

On Earth As It Is In Heaven Easter 2017



Easter is the great victory of Christ that irrevocably defeats the power of death and connects earth and heaven for those who believe. We are ambassadors of that kingdom, called to represent the rules and way of life that will one day be fulfilled when God sets things right. During the Easter Season, we will focus on the Kingdom of God and its embodiment in the life, death and resurrection of Christ. We will explore how Love is the Rule of the Kingdom of Heaven, and how it is to become the Rule of our lives and community of faith. Join in the celebration of the Resurrection and then get ready to unpack its meaning

throughout the whole season of Easter, that we may fulfill our prayer that God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

The Commandment of Christ - The Rule of Love: Jesus commanded love. It was not a suggestion or a wish. Jesus commanded those who claim his name to love one another as he loved us. Knowing that we can't love as fully as Christ has loved us, does not excuse us from reaching for it. The rule of Love is our effort to set a standard capable of moving us from confession of sin to living out our faith. When you stand before the Lord, what do you think that he will be most interested in. Will he care that you know doctrine or that you sought to live your life as a witness to the love of God in Jesus Christ. You are invited to explore how to love as Christ loved us:

Monday, May 8th from 6:30-8pm "How Will We Love": Even if you were unable to attend our first session on April 24, you are invited to join in the continued conversation on love. In the first session, we described what love should look like in thought, word and deed. In this second session, we will discuss how love will be lived in this congregation. We will also discuss how to deal with unloving behavior. This will all be put in a statement to be affirmed and celebrated in the Pentecost Service on June 4.


Council Statement on "Rule of Love": The Church council will be spending some time this month in conversation to develop a statement of how they will lead and use the rule of love developed through the two sessions.



CONCLUDING THE STUDY OF ROMANS

STEWARDSHIP

The United Kingdom, alone among the nations of the world does not have a Treasury Department. Its government has an Exchequer that is run by the Chancellor of the Exchequer. The name is a holdover when the United Kingdom adopted the foreign dual entry accounting system (an Italian product – thanks Paccioli) in the 1840's. Before then the English had an accounting system of the Exchequer based on the old Norman manorial accounting system. Every year the manor lords, dukes and king of the Normans would call in their stewards and hold them accountable for what was spent. The counting was done on the Exchequer, a 10 by 5 board with raised edges (so money would not fall off) with a black cloth with green horizontal and vertical stripes about 6 inches wide on the top. The money was counted in the intersection of the green stripes. Penalties for not accounting for all the money given a year ago by the lord or duke were severe. An ear, a hand or a head! You see these Norman lords and dukes were tough customers.



We talked about taking care of God's stuff last month. Paul tells us in Romans 14:10-12 (New King James Version- NKJV) that we will be held to account:

¹⁰But why do you judge your brother? Or why do you show contempt for your brother? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ. ¹¹For it is written: "As I live, says the LORD, Every knee shall bow to Me, and every tongue shall confess to God."

¹²So then each of us shall give account of himself to God.

We all will be held in account by God for our stewardship and we can't blame someone else for us falling short. Let's face it we all do this – blame someone else - it is part of our human nature..

Good news! We don't have to account to Norman lords! Paul tells us in Philemon 2:4-8 (New King James Version- NKIV):

⁴Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others. ⁵Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, ⁶who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, ⁷but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a servant, *and* coming in the likeness of men. ⁸And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to *the point of* death, even the death of the cross.

Again we are saved by the grace of God, who sent his Son to die for us.

REFORMATION 500 News

Here is an excerpt from *“From Conflict to Communion, Lutheran-Catholic Common Commemoration of the Reformation in 2017; Report of the Lutheran-Roman Catholic Commission on Unity,”* published in 2013.

From the Foreword written by Karlheinz Diez, Auxiliary Bishop of Fulda (On behalf of the Catholic co-chair) and Eero Huovinen, Bishop Emeritus of Helsinki, Lutheran co-chair

“In 2017, Catholic and Lutheran Christians will most fittingly look back on events that occurred 500 years earlier by putting the Gospel of Jesus Christ at the end. The gospel should be celebrated and communicated to the people of our time so that the world may believe that God gives Himself to human beings and calls us into communion with Himself and His church. Herein lies the basis for our joy in our common faith.

To this joy also belongs a discerning, self-critical look at ourselves, not only in our history, but also today. We Christians have certainly not always been faithful to the gospel; all too often we have conformed ourselves to the thought and behavioral patterns of the surrounding world. Repeatedly, we have stood in the way of the good news of the mercy of God.

The true unity of the church can only exist as unity in the truth of the gospel of Jesus Christ. The fact that the struggle for this truth in the sixteenth century led to the loss of unity in Western Christendom belongs to the dark pages of church history. In 2017, we must confess openly that we have been guilty before Christ of damaging the unity of the church. This commemorative year presents us with two challenges: the purification and healing of memories, and the restoration of Christian unity in accordance with the truth of the gospel of Jesus Christ (Ephesians 4:4-6).

The following text describes a way ‘from conflict to communion’ – a way whose goal we have not yet reached. Nevertheless, the Lutheran-Roman Catholic Commission on Unity has taken seriously the words of Pope John XXIII, “The things that unite us are greater than those that divide us.”

We invite all Christians to study the report of our commission both open-mindedly and critically and to come with us along the way to a deeper communion of all Christians.”

In Chapter VI of the report, “Five Ecumenical Imperatives” are listed. They are listed here for your discernment.

The first imperative: Catholics and Lutherans should always begin from the perspective of unity and not from the point of view of division in-order-to strengthen what is held in common even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced.

The second imperative: Lutherans and Catholics must let themselves continuously be transformed by the encounter with the other and by the mutual witness of faith

The third imperative: Catholics and Lutherans should again commit themselves to seek visible unity, to elaborate together what this means in concrete steps, and strive repeatedly toward this goal.

The fourth imperative: Lutherans and Catholics should jointly rediscover the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ for our time.

The fifth imperative: Catholics and Lutherans should witness together to the mercy of God in proclamation and service to the world.
